Recording and digitally photographing the gravestones in Thornbury's Church and Chapel.

There is an increased interest in family history which includes not only information about our ancestors but also about the environments in which they lived and the context of their lives. To support this, many places are recording their gravestones and monumental inscriptions. For example Bradford and Cookbury have both had their inscriptions recorded and made available and recording those in Thornbury will complete the picture.

There are many families that are common to the parishes of Thornbury, Bradford and Cookbury. Families moved and intermarried and so the burials in the churchyards represent the whole community and demonstrate movements over time. I hope to be able to relate the inscriptions to the censuses of the parish as well as to the burial records, and to provide resources to the genealogy community in the area. In the future I would also like to carry out an Oral History project using the names of the local families as a starting point and this project will provide information for this future idea.

I am seeking some financial support from Torridge's Town and Parish fund and would like to establish a small group of interested people to carry out this recording. We will need to:

- Identify or make plans of the graveyards
- Give each gravestone a unique reference number
- Transcribe and digitally record all of the information contained on, or related to each stone
- Photograph each stone to record this information.
- Transfer all of the information into a computer database
- Get copies of the burial register and cross reference the information contained in them to that on the headstones
- Produce a hard copy of the information contained on the headstones as a register to leave in the church and chapel.
- Place a link to the Register on to the Thornbury Hamlets website.
- Think about producing CDs of the images to sell to raise money for church and chapel funds or as the village sees fit.
- Identify families to be involved in the future Oral History project.

A day in the life of Lynden Hughes

First of all I would like to take issue with the word 'day'. I work shifts!!! Which the dark rings under my eyes testify to. If you have seen the sign I attach to the front door when I am sleeping off night shifts then please interpret it as 'Don't ring the door bell', 'Stop your dog from barking' and 'Don't mow your lawns and fields'. To be honest though I don't hear anything through my ear plugs!!

I could not help but have a little smile when I considered the title 'A day in the life of....' for as a police officer with 20 years' service I have always viewed my role as giving me the opportunity to see the whole of life in one day, every day. The vast array of issues that affect us at different points in our lives are but moments for us individually over the course of a lifetime, but for police officers those issues are seen and dealt with all day, each and every day.

I currently hold the position of Critical Incident Manager (CIM) covering North Devon, West Devon, East Devon and Exeter. There will always be 4 CIM's on duty at any one time with the others individually covering Cornwall, South Devon and Plymouth. The role sounds impressive but basically when you strip it down I am effectively a problem solver that links different parts of the organisation together to deal with critical incidents. I also have responsibility for quality assuring service delivery, in other words making sure officers do the right things at the right time and to the best of their ability. I could be called to and asked to oversee basically any type of incident but they generally tend to be of a type that are more serious in nature. I also have responsibility for overseeing the management of missing person enquiries but particularly those that have been graded at the highest of risk to themselves or others.

When I am on duty I cover an area from Hartland to the Dorset border and from the Somerset border down as far as Yelverton near Plymouth, an area that is bigger than some individual police forces. When on duty I have to be contactable at all times whether through my police radio or my police mobile phone. I also have a radio in my car allowing me to be able to monitor two out my three radio channels at the same time. If a critical incident occurs I will generally be made aware through my police radio so for example if I am in Bideford and an incident comes in for Axminster I would change my radio setting from the North Devon channel to the East Devon channel and initially manage the incident over the air from Bideford. With every critical incident I have to make a decision as to whether I need to supervise at the scene. Given the large geographic area I cover I have to judge if my input is better served by travelling to the nearest police station to access a computer terminal and remotely managing or travelling sometimes over an hour to an incident that may have been dealt with by the time I get there. It is a judgement call that is based on the



seriousness of the incident, its complexity, how protracted it will be and importantly if it's very nature is likely to undermine public confidence or diminish community reassurance. If the incident is likely to attract media interest then my role also requires me at times to speak to the newspapers, radio and sometimes television. As part of my detective course we actually had media training and that was when I was first told that I had a face that was better suited to the radio!

The CIM role needs to be delivered at the rank of Inspector as at this rank the law specifically gives me a wide range of legal powers and authorities. For example if someone is in custody for an offence and it is believed that there is evidence at a location where they live or over which they have control then I can give an authority for that premise to be searched. If officers are investigating an offence or they have intelligence that evidence regarding an offence is at a particular location then they would have to apply to a magistrate for a warrant. A magistrate will only consider their application if an Inspector has given an authority for that application. I also have the power to authorise the taking of intimate samples from prisoners and intimate searches (they also have to consent to this) and the power to authorise the taking of non-intimate samples (such as fingerprints) by force if necessary. Persons in custody have a number of rights, some of those rights I have the power to delay or refuse. There are some powers that you never look forward to having to use. For example when a child is taken into police protection the CIM becomes responsible for the management of that protection for the next 72 hours. These are just a few of the powers and authorities I have but what links them all together is that I am legally accountable for making these decisions. Every time I use one of my powers I have to consider the full circumstances of the matter at hand and whether their use is legal, proportionate, necessary and non-discriminatory. important that my decision making rationale is recorded as I could be asked to account for a particular decision at the future trial of a defendant. Any evidence obtained as a result of a wrong decision could be excluded by a judge and therefore could result in a case collapsing. Thinking through your rationale at 4 'o' clock in the morning is a challenge, believe me. The most important power that the constables and sergeants think I have is the authority to authorise their overtime!

The old song goes 'A policeman's lot is not a happy lot' and as in every walk of life you will find some officers complaining about this and that and how everything changes for the worse. But peel away the protective cynicism that officers develop (and have to develop if they are to deal with the demands of the role) and they will admit that there is nothing that compares to the office of constable. An office that every day deals with potentially the worst that life has to offer but in dealing with it also reveals the very best within people, both public and the police. A day in the life of a police officer truly is the whole of life in one day.

P.S Why did God create Police Officers? So the Fire Service could have heroes.
